Southern California's newest aviation museum is located at Santa Monica Airport on virtually the same spot where Douglas Aircraft Co. was founded in 1922. The Museum of Flying, housed inside the contemporary 53,000 square foot Supermarine structure of steel and glass, looms dramatically as you head south on 28th Street from Ocean Park Boulevard, west of the 405 freeway.

Driving toward the Museum of Flying, the first thing one sees is a full scale replica of the Voyager aircraft suspended from the Courtyard's ceiling with vintage bi-planes below. Spanning the complex overhead is the critically-acclaimed DC-3 restaurant with a newly-opened Club Lux, a private party room whose oversized sofas, chairs and tulip-shaped wall sconces create the panache of a vampedup men's club.

Santa Monica Airport, once known as Clover Field, acts as a backdrop for the Museum of Flying's extensive display of aviation past, present and future. Facing the tarmac on the main floor is a panoramic-sized hangar door which is opened for visitors to observe many of the WWII planes start up, taxi, fly and land on the runway outside. Other planes in various stages of restoration are available for observation.


Many of the Museum's docents have flown some of the aircraft on exhibit and share first-hand with visitors the history of warbirds and aviation. Video kiosks stationed by most of the exhibits show dramatic footage of historic planes in action, narrated by Hal Fishman, well-known local newscaster and aviation buff.

Also on view are over 120 wood and metal Douglas production models of concept planes, ranging from the Douglas M1 to current fighters like the F15E Eagle, and an outstanding collection of model aircraft from WWI to the present. A fully equipped theatre shows such classic aviation films as "The Great Air Race of 1924", "Blue Angels", "Blackbird SR-71", and first flight footage of the "B-2 Stealth Bomber".

On September 15th, the Museum kicked off a welcome to the Cockpit, a Beverly Hills aviationrelated clothing store which set up shop alongside the Museum's gift merchandise. Now, the annex of the Cockpit in the Museum, offers visitors twice the diversity of shopping for personal, birthday, and holiday gifts. Of special interest are leather flight jackets, nose art tee shirts, and nostalgic and current styles of aviation flight suits.

Special events facilities are available on all three levels. Capacity crowd inside the museum is 1,200 (32,000 sq. ft.). For larger parties, we tent on the tarmac. The Museum of Flying can also accommodate smaller parties for 20 persons in the Donald Douglas Boardroom or up to 150 persons in the 3rd level Patron's area. We welcome cocktail receptions, weddings, mitzvahs, business conferences, screenings, office parties, wrap/industry parties and conventions. The DC-3 restaurant is available to cater events.
